Introduction & Methodology

- Warwickshire Police and the Warwickshire Office of the Police and Crime Commissioner (OPCC), seek to obtain the views of residents, including their confidence in Warwickshire Police, to inform the PCC's plan priorities
- Warwickshire Police & the OPCC commissioned SMSR, a third party research agency, to conduct surveys over the phone and face to face with Warwickshire residents
- The questionnaire includes key questions taken from the Crime Survey for England and Wales (CSEW)
- Where relevant, comparisons with CSEW are displayed. Comparisons with CSEW include the average score of forces included in Warwickshire Police's most similar group (MSG)**. Where comparisons have been made, results have been consistently analysed in accordance with this external reporting
- During the period of 3rd 16th Feb 2020, SMSR have interviewed a representative sample of 750 residents 150 across each of the 5
 Policing Districts: North Warwickshire; Nuneaton and Bedworth; Rugby; Stratford-on-Avon and North & Warwick
- Results have been weighted to accurately represent the population size of each District
- The report provides an overview of results by demographics and geography

Summary

Securing an Effective and Efficient Police Service

- Over three-quarters (78%) of respondents had confidence in Warwickshire Police
- Residents felt the highest priorities for Warwickshire Police should be responded quickly to emergency calls, investigating and detecting serious crime as well as preventing and reducing serious crime
- Over half (52%) were confident the police use their stop and search powers fairly and respectfully, with only 2% that felt this was not the case
- Three-quarters (76%) were in agreement that more front-line police officers in Warwickshire carrying Taser would give them additional reassurance
- Over nine-tenths (92%) stated that the use of Body Worn Video Cameras gives them additional reassurance with a similar proportion that felt officers should be given more protection when carrying out their duties (93%)

Summary

Consultation and Engagement

- Over three-quarters (77%) felt that Warwickshire Police understood the issues affecting their community
- Over half agreed they would like to know more about the police and their activities (63%), they'd like to know more about the PCC's Police and Crime Plan (54%) and they want to be informed on the activities of the local policing team in their neighbourhood (52%)

Putting Victims and Survivors First

- Just over a tenth (12%) had been a victim of crime or anti-social behaviour over the last 12 months
- Respondents felt that bringing offenders to justice (57%) and safeguarding from harm (53%) were the most important elements of victim care


Protecting people from Harm

• Respondents felt that all the priorities outlined in Warwickshire Police's Police and Crime Plan were important, with each aspect deemed important by at least nine-tenths

Commissioning and Grants (or Priorities & Funding)

- Over half (56%) felt the Grants Scheme should be increased, around a fifth (19%) felt it should remain the same, with only a small minority (3%) that felt it should be decreased
- The Protection of Children (65%) was seen as the most important priority for Warwickshire Police and Crime Commissioner's funding, followed by Sexual Offences (49%) and Domestic Abuse (49%)








More than three-quarters had confidence in Warwickshire Police



Responding quickly to emergency calls & investigating and detecting serious crime deemed the highest priority





Key Insights


Over nine-tenths felt responding quickly to emergency calls from the public & investigating and detecting serious crimes should be the highest priority for Warwickshire Police

Preventing and reducing serious crime & focusing on crimes committed against the vulnerable also seen as high priorities

Less than a tenth felt responding to non-emergency calls from the public was a high priority — over a third thought this should be a low priority

More respondents felt reducing anti-social behaviour, policing the night time economy in town centres and policing of rural communities should be a medium priority than felt they should be a high priority

High agreement levels towards all statements





Key Insights

Over four-fifths agreement towards all statements considered with disagreement not exceeding 3% for any of the statements


Highest agreement that Warwickshire Police should work with other forces to tackle terrorism and cross border criminality, with over two-thirds that strongly agreed with this

North Warwickshire and Rugby tended to be more inclined to strongly agree with these statements


Generally the older the respondent, the more likely they were to strongly agree

Respondents with a disability more likely to strongly agree than those without a disability


Over half confident that the police use their stop and search powers fairly and respectfully




Over nine out of every ten felt Body Worn Video Cameras gives them additional reassurance

Over three-quarters felt Warwickshire Police understand the issues that affect their community



Key Insights

Over three-quarters felt that Warwickshire Police understands the issues in their community with less than a tenth that disagreed this was the case

Over half agreed they would like to know more about the police and their activities, they want to be informed on the activities of the local policing team in their neighbourhood and they'd like to know more about the PCC's Police and Crime Plan

Respondents in Nuneaton and Bedworth tended to be more agreeable towards these statements

Females and respondents with a disability were more inclined to agree with these statements










Section Four Putting Victims and Survivors First








Over a tenth had been a victim of crime or ASB within the last 12 months



Bringing offenders to justice & safeguarding from harm viewed as the most important elements of victim care





Key Insights

Access to support services was deemed the least important element of victim care

The younger the respondent the more likely they were to place importance on safeguarding from harm

Respondents with a disability more likely to place importance on safeguarding from harm compared to those without a disability

Those aged 26-39, 40-64 and BAME respondents most likely to place importance on bringing offenders to justice at court

North Warwickshire most likely to value safeguarding from harm, Nuneaton and Bedworth most likely to value Bringing offenders to justice










Section Five Protecting People from Harm







Very high levels of importance placed on all aspects of the Police and Crime Plan





Key Insights

Every priority of Warwickshire Police's Police and Crime Plan was deemed important by over nine-tenths of respondents

Over three-quarters considered it very important to ensure people are protecting from sexual exploitation and sexual violence & to address 'hidden crime' like domestic abuse, child abuse, human trafficking and honour-based violence

Residents of North Warwickshire more inclined to have said these priorities are very important

Females and those with a disability more likely to have said these priorities were very important










Section Six Commissioning and Grants (or Priorities & Funding)







Protection of Children seen as the biggest priority for funding – Sexual Offences also seen as important



Key Insights

Nearly two-thirds considered Protection of Children as the biggest priority, with half considering Sexual Offences a priority and two-fifths Domestic Abuse

Less than a fifth considered Youth Schemes, Community Safety Partnerships, Cyber Crime and Rural Crime a priority


Those aged over 65 most likely to feel Protection of Children was a priority

The younger the respondent the more likely they were to consider Sexual Offences as a priority

Males more likely than females to deem Sexual Offences as a priority

North Warwickshire the most likely area to consider Protection of Children as a priority with Warwick the most likely to have said Sexual Offences was a priority

Over half felt the Grants Scheme should be increased – only 3% felt it should be decreased



Q16 The Commissioner's Grants Scheme is an annual fund that seeks to support initiatives which will make a positive contribution to the objectives of the Police and Crime Plan.
